Friday 19th April, Good Friday, 2.00pm - Reflections at St Modoc's Church, Doune, 7.00pm - Service at Gargunnoch.


Sunday 21st April - Easter Sunday Service at 10.30am

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# Gargunnoch Community Council and Community Trust Updates

## Gargunnoch Community Council

### Beeches Walk Survey Results

Enclosed with the February edition of the village newspaper – The Bugle – was a short questionnaire, issued by the Community Trust, which asked for residents' views on their usage of, and proposed improvements to, the Beeches Walk. Eighty-two questionnaires were returned, by the closing date at the end of February, which represents a response rate of slightly under 30%. It is considered that this level of response is sufficiently high to be considered as representative of village opinion. Of the 82 responses, 73 (89%) answered "Yes" to Question 1 about support for path improvements; 7 (9%) answered "No" and 2 (2%) answered "Don't Know". The "Don't knows" were reserving their position until they knew more about the details of the proposal. This was also a factor influencing the "Noes" but they also were concerned that the rural character might change and that more bikes might be encouraged to use the path. According to the answers to Question 2, which asked how many people in the household generally use the Beeches Path there is a high level of usage amongst respondents to the survey, with a fifth using it every day and nearly two-thirds of respondents using it on at least a weekly basis. This clearly indicates the importance of the path to the village. In addition to the answers to the specific questions, 58 respondents also attached additional comments to their response. The most frequent comment (30%) was that the proposal was a great idea and was very much supported. Just over a fifth of responses (22%) expressed hopes and concerns that the essential woodland/rural character of the walk would not be adversely affected by improvements and in particular that they would be carried out sensitively. ## Gargunnoch – Stirling Cycleway Feasibility Study

Several village consultation exercises have highlighted the desirability of an off-road, cycle/footpath link between Gargunnoch and Stirling. In February the Community Trust applied for and secured a Community Links grant of £15000 from Sustrans to carry out a feasibility study on such a link. Following a competitive tendering process the Trust has appointed Sweco to carry out the study, which will look at the technical, economic and social issues associated with two possible routes: [1] the former railway line and [2] a line adjacent to the A811, and recommend a preferred option. It is anticipated that the work will be completed by mid-May, following which, a public meeting will be arranged by the Trust to discuss the findings with the village.

The following groups were awarded funds to support their projects from the Gargunnoch Wind Farm Fund from the last round of applications in February. Forth Valley Orienteers awarded £450 towards producing an orienteering map of Gargunnoch. Gargunnoch After School Club awarded £2000 to assist with increasing costs. Gargunnoch Primary Parent Council awarded £4000 towards setting up a digital hub for the pupils. Gargunnoch Curling Club awarded £1750 towards marketing costs and trophy purchases. Gargunnoch Community Trust awarded £12,671 towards the procurement of a sound system to meet various community needs. Gargunnoch Old Kirkyard awarded £175 towards the production of local interest leaflets. Gargunnoch Brownies awarded £242.25 towards the procurement of support materials for the new girl guiding badges. Gargunnoch SWI awarded £300 towards the cost of transport for a trip to Glamis Castle.

## Fruit Tree Planting



With the end of term and end of the planting season rapidly approaching it was time to get digging in the new Glebe Park. It had to be all hands to the spades to get the ground prepared. Once again two faithful villagers were "volunteered" into preparing the ground for the fruit trees, and some of the Criminal Justice Team got stuck into digging for victory in the wild flower garden adjacent to the picnic bench.

Then the whole of the school, 60 pupils, teachers and assistants expertly organised by Mrs Rushton, the head teacher, were split into groups representing their school houses, and in some atrocious weather set to and within a couple of hours nine fruit trees and hundreds of wild flower seeds were planted and sown. It was remarked upon by John Hancox "The Apple Man" how well behaved the children were, a credit to the school and the village.

Work on The Glebe park has been funded by the Falck Renewables Kingsburn Windfarm Community Fund, managed by the Gargunnoch Community Trust. Work has been supported by the volunteer efforts of the community working with charitable organisations such as "On the Verge" and "The Woodland Trust".

## MP SEEKS REPORT ON A811 BECOMING A TRUNK ROAD

Stephen Kerr, MP for Stirling, is continuing to campaign for the important A811 road to be upgraded to Trunk Road status and become the responsibility of Transport Scotland. This would mean more attention and prominence for this vital artery for rural Stirlingshire.

To kick the campaign into a new gear, Stephen has written to Michael Matheson, The Scottish Government Cabinet Secretary for Transport, asking that a formal appraisal be sought from Transport Scotland on the upgrade of the road. Making that upgrade would bring about more investment and ensure the road is maintained to a high standard. Stephen has also written to over two hundred businesses located along the route, national haulage companies and the community councils concerned. "I firmly believe that this heavily used and important route is a clear contender to become a Trunk Road and join the A84 and A85 as recognised linking routes across the area. I very much hope a formal appraisal is carried out and this issue progresses."

## On The Buses

The return of the C12 evening buses to their direct route finally started on the 18th January. All evening buses now go via Dumbarton Road. The times have been altered so please check before you travel. First Scotland East have produced a new booklet timetable, albeit 6 weeks after the service started. For anyone who has still not managed to get a copy they are sporadically available on some buses and local shops. In January, Buchlyvie Community Council wrote to the Environment and Housing Convener requesting that a Sunday Service on the Balfon to Stirling route now be considered a priority. This letter was supported by Gargunnoch, Balfon and Arnprior (Kippen Community Council had yet to be formed). There is no further update on this but we are hoping that both Stirling Council and First Bus will work together to address this matter and make this route accessible 7 days a week.

Unfortunately, the Friday, Saturday early evening pilot buses are not being supported. We hope to see a rise in numbers now that the bus is going the direct route via Dumbarton Road. However, if patronage does not improve there is a strong possibility these two buses will be withdrawn.

The condition of the Balfon Buses continues to cause concern with yet another winter of no heating and water ingress on these old vehicles.

There is no sign of the upgrades promised to Bruce Crawford MSP in June last year. The one fully refurbished Balfon bus still had no heating and water ingress after its upgrade. Other than a repaint, passengers failed to notice the vehicle had been refurbished at all! We are hoping that the new rules surrounding emissions in Glasgow will in turn force First to finally improve the quality of the vehicles operated out of the Balfon Depot.

## Old Leckie Farm Spring Update

Spring has now officially sprung as the spring equinox heralds that lovely day when we have more daylight than darkness. Not that's it been a bad winter on the farm - drier and less snowy than the year before, scientifically measured by the depth of sticky mud on my wellies as I haul hay bales out to feed the sheep through the months when the grass doesn't grow.

The warm front in February saw first early potatoes being optimistically planted and the salad beds in the poly tunnel being prepped for another busy growing season. Calving has started in the sheds as the cows start eyeing up the grass in the fields, willing it to start growing so they can get back out to fresh pasture.

If you're walking through the farm at the moment you'll see the pregnant ewes in the fields nearer to the main farm sheds as lambing beckons. They're fed with sheep 'nuts' in the morning as well as hay to keep them nutritionally balanced and in good health as their pregnancy develops. We take the single and triplet ewes into the sheds to lamb, leaving the twins to lamb outside.

Please keep dogs in close and under control as you walk through the farm so as not to spook the sheep and their newborns.

Looking ahead we're really excited to be helping the Gargunnoch Farmers Club celebrate their 225th anniversary this year and will be co-hosting a charity Barn Dance on the farm on Saturday 29th June. Keep the date free for an evening of good dancing, good food and good company - tickets will be on sale soon! Alison Younger

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## Police Report

The current ward priorities for the Forth and Endrick area are Antisocial Behaviour, Road Safety, Theft and Community Engagement and Reassurance. The following is a summary of local policing activity since the last edition of The Bugle.

**Antisocial Behaviour** - There has been very minor acts of anti-social behaviour. An act of minor vandalism and an argument between neighbours since the last article.

**Sheep Worrying** - This time of year presents the problem of sheep worrying. Dog owners are being warned their animal could be killed if it is found to be in the presence of sheep, even if it has not physically attacked them or chased them. A dog attacking, chasing or even being at large in a field where sheep are kept can lead to significant injury and often leads to the sheep being killed or destroyed. Such attacks have a financial and emotional impact on the farmer and cause immense suffering to the animals and are avoidable if dog owners follow some simple steps. The vast majority of livestock worrying incidents involve sheep and can occur when a dog attacks, chases or in the case of sheep, is at large (not on a lead or otherwise under close control) in a field where livestock is kept. The effects of a dog attack are evident and cannot be overstated but significant damage can also be caused by a dog simply being present in a field. Pregnant ewes can abort their lambs or lambs can be separated from their mothers. The advice to dog owners who live in rural areas or anyone walking and exercising their dogs in the countryside is to ensure they are under control at all times and avoid going into fields where livestock is grazing. The Scottish Outdoor Access Code says dogs shouldn't be taken into fields where there are lambs or other young farm animals. We will be looking to enforce the legislation and any reported cases of sheep worrying will be investigated and offenders reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

**Domestic Abuse** - There has recently been an advert on tv highlighting a campaign about Domestic Abuse. Domestic abuse can exist in all types of relationships between partners and ex partners. There is a common misconception that domestic abuse is just physical abuse. This is not the case. Domestic abuse can be physical, sexual, emotional or mental abuse. The abuse may be committed in the home or elsewhere including online

**Hate Crime** - This year's hate crime campaign focuses on people who work in the night time economy, for example taxi and private hire drivers, those working in late night retail stores and takeaways. Research shows that these individuals are more likely to be victims of hate crime, and we aim to raise awareness of the problem and encourage reporting of incidents to police. A hate crime is "any crime which is perceived by the victim or any other person to be motivated (wholly or partly) by malice and ill-will towards a social group". Perpetrators of hate crime focus on targeting individuals on the basis of actual or presumed:

•Disability •Race •Religion/Belief •Sexual Orientation •Transgender Identity

**#StopItNow** - A new campaign, #StopItNow, aims to prevent the online grooming of children and young people in preparation for contact offences by directing offenders and potential perpetrators to Stop It Now! Scotland. Between April 2018 and February 2019 nearly 1600 crimes were recorded where an individual communicated with a child for sexual purposes, this resulted in nearly 70 per cent of the perpetrators being arrested and charged. Working with Stop It Now! Scotland, we have developed a campaign that taps into the biggest fear of perpetrators, that their families will find out and that they will face public exposure for their offences.

**Road Safety** - The Central Scotland Safety Camera Partnership and Police Scotland have continued to perform speed enforcement and hi-visibility patrols in and around Gargunnoch. These resulted with fixed penalty tickets for speeding but also a vehicle being uplifted as the driver was driving with no insurance. We will continue to carry out such patrols and checks over the coming months. There has been reports of inconsiderate parking by motorists within the village. This will be monitored and if appropriate offenders will be dealt with.

**Theft** - There have been no incidents of theft in the Gargunnoch area since the last article however local residents are reminded of the importance of being vigilant and reporting any suspicious activity to Police no matter how trivial it may seem. When we receive these reports they are investigated and the appropriate action taken. Such reports are always encouraged and welcomed.

An invitation to a free Open Day in the Kirk on Saturday 11th May, with teas and home baking, a village history display plus guided walks around the old kirkyard, will drop onto your doormat in the next month, along with a new leaflet about the Gargunnoch Old Kirkyard. The invitation will have details of the opening and walk times. The background to this is that, 2 years ago, Rev Andy Campbell invited a few of us to form the Welcome Team, the purpose of which was to think of ideas for the Church community to engage more with the village community. Currently, we are Douglas Barr, Mairi Jackson, Libby MacPhee, Rev Lynne Mack, Jeremy Wilkinson, and me, Helen Rowell. We came up with several ideas and one of the more memorable was when Dr Murray Cook came to speak to a packed church about our local history and archaeology, and a guided walk of Keir Hill, last year.

Douglas and I were then tasked with producing a couple of leaflets of interest for visitors and locals.
